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CFIDS/ME (CHRONIC FATIGUE IMMUNE DYSFUNCTION SYNDROME/MYALGIC ENCEPHALOMYELITIS)

Fatigue is the leading diagnostic dilemma in primary practice—estimated at 24% in any clinical population (JAMA 1988). As a non-specific symptom, diagnosis presents a formidable task for the clinician.

Chronic Fatigue Syndrome (CFS). An increasing body of literature indicates a specific chronic illness characterized by fatigue, neurologic and immunologic disorders. CFS/ME is a growing cause of disability worldwide. What is its cause? How do you distinguish it from other diseases?

OBJECTIVES
